The word "Flagrante"comes from the verb "Flagro - Flagrare meaning To Blaze, To Burn, to Glow or to Flame. The present participle "Flagrantes" means "Burning, or Glowing or Flaming." The word "Bello" comes from "Bellum meaning War, Fighting, Battle or hostilities.

The Secretary of War approves the following distinctive insignia for wear as a part of the uniform of this organization:

SHIELD:

Party per chevron or and gules, a chevronel azure between in sinister chief a Cheyenne war bonnet and in base a grissly bear passant both proper. On a canton tenne a dragon passant of the first (for the 1st Cavalry).

MOTTO:

Flagrante Bello.

The insignia is the shield and motto of the coat-of-arms of the 83rd Field Artillery and will be manufactured in bright metal and enamel in one size, as the regiment may select, but not in excess of 14 inches in height.

TO BE WORN:

By officers: On the service uniform on the upper portion of the shoulder loops of coat; on the front of the service hat midway between band and crease.

On white uniform same as on service coat. On mess jacket on both lapels above line of miniature medals.

#### By enlisted personnel:

On the service uniform on both sides of the collar 3/4 of an inch in rear of the service insignia; on the front of the service hat midway between band and crease.
